MOTION: Dennise Burbank made a motion to approve the entire consent calendar, Carmen Rodriguez seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Organizational Standards and Informational items

- **Regional housing Presentation/update** – Gus Becerra reported the following:
 - Regional Housing is a public agency that serves Colusa, Nevada, Yuba & Sutter Counties in an effort to bring housing of all income level to each of the communities.
 - Recent affordable housing projects that are under construction or have been completed by Regional Housing:
 - Linda--Cedar Lane Project—108-unit low-income housing, 41-unit permanent supportive housing, completed about three years ago
 - Plumas Lake- River Oaks Family Apartments - 48-unit complex, completed about one year ago
 - Wheatland – Bear Ridge Project- 48-unit family complex, completed about three years ago
 - Wheatland - 32-unit Senior low-income housing for ages 62+, completed July 2025
 - Yuba City – 133-unit low-income housing project featuring 1, 2 and 3 bedroom units recently broke ground and is anticipated to be completed in late 2027.
 - A community center was included in the Wheatland Senior housing project that can be used by the entire community

- They do not provide property management themselves, they work with private companies to manage the properties, which is more cost effective.
 - A housing bond will be on the November ballot that he encouraged all to vote yes on to help secure funding for future affordable housing projects.
- **Review, discuss and approve updated YCCSC bylaws to adjust board member term limits** – Brynda Stranix reported at the last YCCSC board meeting it was requested to extend board member term limits from two consecutive four-year terms, to four consecutive four-year terms to help alleviate losing good board members due to terming out too soon. The bylaws with suggested changes, indicated in red ink, were included in the agenda packet for review. Group reviewed.

MOTION: Dennise Burbank made a motion to approve the updated bylaws with the extension of board member term limits, Crystal Mirabal seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

- **Discuss Salvation Army Depot closure** – Brynda Stranix reported Salvation Army announced they would have to close the Depot by the end of January due to financial hardships they have endured for decades. YCCSC had allocated \$36,000 of 2026 CSBG funding to the Depot which will need to be re-allocated.
- **Complete 2026 Board member Income Certification** – Group discussed that need each board member to complete and return a 2026 income certification.
- **Review 2025 Point in Time Homeless Count results** – Brynda Stranix reported every two years, the Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium organizes a Point In Time (PIT) count of unsheltered individuals. The results from the January 2025 PIT count, which were recently released, are included in the packet. Group reviewed and discussed the final report, noticing the numbers seem low in comparison to what is seen on the streets.

- **Review and approve YCCSC Executive Director 2025 Annual Review** – Rich Webb reported the 2025 executive committee completed the review, met with Brynda to discuss it and the final review is included in the agenda packet for full board discussion and approval. Group reviewed.

 - **2026-2027 Strategic Plan** – Jackie Slade reported the new 2026-2027 Strategic Plan (approved November 2025) was included in the agenda packet for information only.
 - **Staff Report on 2026-2027 Strategic Plan Activities December/January 2026 update** - Brynda Stranix reported the staff report aligns with the new 2026-2027 Strategic Plan and provides updates for the last two months on programmatic activities by YCCSC management, service providers and other community efforts assisting the low-income and progress toward achieving YCCSC's Strategic Plan objectives and key strategies.

 - **Enrique Figueroa resignation as District 5 member** – Rich Webb reported Enrique's resignation email is the agenda packet for review. Jackie Slade to reach out to District 5 Supervisor, Jon Messick, to determine if he wants to sit on the board or if he has another representative.
 - **Review and approve application from Devon Diamond for a Private Sector board position** – Group reviewed and discussed that Devon meets the qualifications to be a private sector rep and is a well-respected member of the Marysville Kiwanis Club.

MOTION: Don Schrader made a motion to approve Devon Diamond as a private sector representative, Dennise Burbank seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.
 - **1 Low-income vacancy since January 2025, 2 private sector vacancies since December 2025 and 1 District 5 vacancy** – Group discussed the many vacancies YCCSC currently has and suggested Jackie Slade reach out to recently termed out board members, Angie Gates and John Nicoletti, to see if they have an interest in coming back on the board with the newly updated bylaws allowing for longer terms. Crystal Mirabal to reach out to a potential private sector applicant to determine interest.
- **Allocation Committee** (Entire board)
 - **Conflict Disclosure/Declaration-Excuse board members with conflict of interest** – No conflicts with members in attendance.
 - **Review revised proposal from Salvation Army for possible 2026 CSBG funding and determine re-allocation of \$36,000 originally allocated to Salvation Army Depot** – Brynda Stranix reminded the group that they had allocated \$36,000 in 2026 CSBG funds to the Salvation Army Depot program in November 2025. In January 2026, Salvation Army reported the Depot was closing, disqualifying them for the \$36,000 allocation. YCCSC staff asked Salvation Army to resubmit an application with a new scope of work to be considered by the board to possibly receive the now un-allocated \$36,000.

The new application was included in the agenda packet for review. Group discussed the new proposal that requests \$50,000 for the Hope Express and Fresh Friday’s food programs. The board requested staff follow with Salvation Army to determine the level of services that could be provided for \$36,000 before they made a decision. Once information is obtained, staff will send out a voting ballot to the board via email.

NEW BUSINESS – Discuss service provider presentation for March 2026 meeting – Group discussed and would like Johnny Burke with Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium to give an update on their activities, similar to a presentation he recently gave to the Yuba County Board of Supervisors.

- Dennise Burbank reported So You Can’s Christmas give-away helped 500 families that included 1,400 children. Olivehurst Public Utilities District (OPUD) is getting ready to remodel the Youth Center by Olivehurst Pool. It will hold a few hundred people for events.
- Brynda Stranix reported April 24th is Marysville Kiwanis Annual Golf Tournament fundraiser.
- Jackie Slade reported she is working with sub-grantees on 2025 annual report completion and 2026 contract document submittal.

ACTION ITEM REQUIRING INDIVIDUAL CONSIDERATION AND MOTION

- **Review and discuss revised proposal from Salvation Army for possible 2026 CSBG funding and determine re-allocation of \$36,000 originally allocated to Salvation Army Depot**

Jackie Slade reminded the board they had requested additional information from Salvation Army at the last board meeting to clarify what level of services in their Fresh Friday's and/or Hope Express programs could be provided for \$36,000 as opposed to the \$50,000 requested in the revised proposal. A vote by email ballot was distributed to the board with the information, however it was requested to meet in person/via Zoom to better discuss the re-allocation of \$36,000 in 2026 CSBG funding, originally earmarked for Salvation Army Depot, as opposed to the vote by email.

Jackie Slade reported due to limited demographic information collected by Salvation Army for the 2025 contract that funded the Hope Express program, it is suggested to not fund that program this year. Salvation Army staff has indicated a much more thorough collection of data is done for the Fresh Fridays program, making it a better fit for CSBG funding.

Group discussed the revised proposal, focusing on the Fresh Friday's program including the statement that volunteers run the program and the cost indicated for food.

MOTION: Andi Crivello made a motion to approve \$12,000 to Salvation Army's Fresh Friday program and the remaining \$24,000 to Yuba-Sutter Food Bank, Dennise Burbank seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

Carmen Rodriguez discussed her need to resign from the board as a low-income sector representative and submitted a formal written resignation to Jackie Slade.

YCCSC 2025 Agency Management Accomplishments (090)

#1 Describe a notable management accomplishment achieved by the agency during the reporting year (2025). Describe how responsible, informed leadership and effective, efficient processes led to high-quality, accessible, and well-managed services and strategies.

Yuba County Community Services Commission sub-grantee, Child Advocates of Placer, Yuba and Sutter County (CASA) reported the following management changes:

In 2025, we implemented a bold and innovative restructuring of our organizational framework to better align our staffing capacity with the needs of the youth and families we serve. Recognizing the importance of adaptability and resource optimization, we eliminated two leadership roles—a Director and a Lead Program Manager—in our CASA program. While this could have been seen as a challenge, it became an opportunity for transformation. Instead of backfilling these roles, we empowered existing staff with strong tenures in program development and management to step into leadership positions. This not only fostered professional growth and internal development but also created a more streamlined and dynamic leadership structure.

The cost savings from this restructuring were strategically reinvested into two critical areas: Volunteer Recruitment and Community Engagement. With additional resources devoted to these departments, we've achieved remarkable outcomes. We successfully recruited more volunteers than in the previous year, expanding the impact of our efforts to foster youth and families. Additionally, our enhanced focus on Community Engagement has allowed us to build a stronger, more recognizable brand within the community, amplifying our mission and broadening support for our programs.

The restructuring was not just a logistical change; it was a strategic pivot toward sustainability, efficiency, and organizational growth. By empowering our team, optimizing resources, and prioritizing direct impact, we've strengthened our ability to serve our community while creating a model of adaptability and creativity that will yield results for many years to come.

#2 Provide an example of ways in which the agency addressed a cause or condition of poverty in the community using an innovative or creative approach. List the following headers with your response:

Agency/Program Name: Yuba County Community Services Commission sub-grantee, New Day Training Center, Group Therapy Program

CSBG service category: Health and Social/Behavioral Development

Description of program: New Day Training Center operates a comprehensive access-to-care and capacity-building service model designed to reduce barriers to behavioral health services for low-income, uninsured, underserved populations, and students in Sutter and Yuba Counties. The program serves individuals and families experiencing economic hardship and limited access to care, and functions as a 96% Medi-Cal clinic. During the reporting year, the agency delivered over 15,000 clinical service sessions.

Services are provided year-round and include sliding scale therapy, pro bono mental health services, grant-funded therapeutic groups, and trauma-informed clinical care utilizing Somatic Experiencing (SE) principles. Group services are typically structured in 8–10 week cycles throughout the year. Clinicians and trainees participated in two 4-day Somatic Experiencing trainings, expanding the organization's capacity to deliver trauma-informed, body-based therapeutic interventions. Over 5,000 clinical sessions were delivered using Somatic Experiencing-informed approaches during the reporting period.

The program operates throughout Sutter and Yuba Counties and prioritizes accessible, community-based, culturally responsive service delivery for individuals and families with limited financial resources.

How innovative/creative: The agency's approach is innovative through its integration of trauma-informed training, workforce development, and direct service delivery into a unified access-to-care model. New Day Training Center implemented a body-based therapeutic framework by training master's-level students and clinicians in Somatic Experiencing, enabling them to deliver trauma-informed, nervous-system-based care to low-income and underserved populations. This model represents a new service approach within the region and expands access to evidence-informed trauma treatment for communities that traditionally lack access to specialized services.

The program is further innovative in its capacity-building structure, which simultaneously develops a trained clinical workforce while expanding community access to care. By embedding advanced trauma training within a community clinic setting, the organization created a sustainable service pipeline that strengthens clinical quality, service availability, and long-term system capacity.

In addition, the program implemented an integrated family-support model by pairing grant-funded parenting groups with a parallel, peer counselor-led childcare and emotional regulation group. This model removed access barriers for parents, supported family engagement, and created a dual-generation service structure that addressed both adult and child emotional well-being while strengthening participation and retention in services.

Outcomes achieved: The program delivered over 15,000 clinical sessions during the reporting year, including over 5,000 sessions utilizing Somatic Experiencing-informed approaches. Hundreds of individuals and families accessed services through sliding scale and pro bono programming, and multiple grant-funded therapeutic groups were implemented across the year in Sutter and Yuba Counties.

Grant-funded group services demonstrated measurable client outcomes, including improved emotional regulation, increased engagement in self-care activities, enhanced emotional identification skills, and improved family functioning. Parenting group documentation reflects structured curriculum delivery, consistent participation, pre- and post-assessment tracking, and positive behavioral and emotional changes among participants.

In parallel, a peer counselor-led childcare and emotional regulation group was implemented alongside the parenting group to support family access and engagement. Documentation shows consistent participation by children, structured trauma-informed activities (including grounding techniques, emotional identification, breathing exercises, and regulation strategies), and improvements in emotional expression, self-regulation, and social engagement among participating children.

Clinician and peer counselor reports further indicate faster activation of body-based regulation strategies and improved emotional processing capacity among clients receiving Somatic Experiencing-informed services.

How CSBG funds were used: CSBG funds were used to support clinician compensation, group facilitation, trauma-informed training costs, administrative and program coordination support, reporting and compliance infrastructure, community outreach activities, client support services, program evaluation, and organizational infrastructure necessary to sustain service delivery. Funding directly supported the expansion of access to care, workforce development, service delivery capacity, and long-term sustainability of trauma-informed programming for low-income and underserved populations.

Local partners involved and how contributed: Local partnerships were central to program implementation and outreach. Partners included schools throughout Sutter and Yuba Counties, which supported referrals and access

to services; churches and faith-based organizations that supported community outreach and engagement; referral agencies including Casa de Esperanza; Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health; and local clinical practitioners and community-based service providers. These partnerships strengthened referral pathways, community trust, service coordination, and access for underserved populations.

#3 Provide an example of changes made by the agency in 2025 to improve service delivery and enhance impact for individuals, families, and communities with low incomes based on their in-depth analysis of performance data. Yuba County Community Services Commission sub-grantee, Yuba-Sutter Food Bank reported the following:

Problem: Additional pantry locations and distribution times were needed to ensure food access in more neighborhoods and to better accommodate varying schedules for individuals and families.

Insight/change based on performance data: Through ongoing conversations with clients, partner agencies, and staff, the agency identified consistent feedback indicating gaps in geographic coverage and limited access due to distribution schedules. This qualitative performance data highlighted the need for expanded outlets and increased flexibility in service delivery.

Changes made: The agency increased the number of USDA food distributions and added six new partner agencies to expand food access in underserved neighborhoods. In addition, one existing partner agency added two new pantry locations, further increasing availability and convenience for clients.

RE: Staff Report on 2026-2027 Strategic Plan Update of Activities- February/March 2026

GOAL 1: INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES WITH LOW-INCOMES ARE STABLE AND ACHIEVE ECONOMIC SECURITY

OBJECTIVE: Increase homelessness prevention and reduction services (including financial literacy, rent/deposit assistance)

Support agencies that provide emergency funds for unexpected hardships (utilities, rent, car repair, rental deposits, etc.)

- February 2026, Bridges to Housing reported the new donation link on their website is live for those who would like to donate and share.
- \$20,000 in 2026 YCCSC Regular funding was awarded to Habitat for Humanity to provide financial assistance to low-income Yuba County residents for rent and utilities to help avoid eviction and prevent homelessness.
- \$15,000 in 2026 YCCSC Regular funding was awarded by the YCCSC board to Bridges to Housing to provide rental deposits, rent payments and other housing assistance to low-income clients.

Support agencies that provide emergency shelter and counseling/education services (including domestic violence services)

- \$32,000 in 2026 YCCSC funding was awarded to Regional Emergency Shelter Team (REST) to provide emergency overnight shelter, hot meals, hygiene supplies and case management support for unhoused individuals and families during the winter months.

Support agencies that provide affordable legal services to help low-income obtain or maintain income, housing and medical care

- \$25,000 in 2026 YCCSC Regular funding was awarded to Yuba-Sutter Legal Services for Seniors to provide free legal services and advocacy for low-income persons age 60 and over in Yuba County to help them obtain or maintain their income, housing and medical care.

OBJECTIVE: Improve access to food and basic needs

Support agencies that provide access to healthy food

- \$48,863 in 2026 YCCSC funding was awarded to Yuba-Sutter Food Bank to support their food sourcing and partner agency program to help expand access to food and basic needs for low-income residents and the food insecure.

Support increased food distribution days/times available to accommodate working families

- March 2026, Yuba-Sutter Food Bank, in partnership with Adventure Church, is hosting a food giveaway and community event on Sunday, March 22 from 10am-12 noon.
- February 2026, Yuba-Sutter Food Distribution Schedule indicates the following:
 - There are 13 food pantries/food giveaways in Yuba County, 5 of which distribute at times convenient for working families.
 - In addition, of the ten USDA distributions/Community Food Giveaways in Yuba County, the following are available for working families:
 - USDA Food Distribution 3rd Saturday of the month 10-11am at Marysville Bible Baptist Church, N. Beale Road, Linda
 - USDA Food Distribution 3rd Tuesday of the month 5-6pm at Wheatland High School, Wheatland Road, Wheatland
 - Community Food Giveaway 4th Saturday of the month 9am at Ella Elementary, Olivehurst Ave., Olivehurst

OBJECTIVE: Reduce barriers to stability for vulnerable populations

Support agencies that provide job training programs/skills and education required for employment and/or job advancement

- February 2026, Yuba College announced the expansion of its Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) support for students in need. EOPS serves students who demonstrate financial and academic need. Beyond traditional counseling, the programs offer financial grants, textbook and supply assistance, career exploration, budgeting workshops, parenting resources and transfer support. to learn more and apply at <https://yc.yccd.edu/student/eops/>.

Promote and market the new Yuba-Sutter Transit Mobility on Demand system to assist low-income and mobility challenged individuals access employment and educational opportunities

- February/March 2026, shared Yuba-Sutter Transit's bus tracking app information on YCCSC facebook page.

Support programs designed to promote self-sufficiency, accountability and life skills training

- \$15,000 in 2026 YCCSC Regular funding was awarded to Child Advocates of Placer, Yuba and Sutter County to support the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program that provides support and mentorship for foster youth in Yuba County.

GOAL 2: THE CONDITION IN WHICH LOW-INCOME PEOPLE LIVE IS IMPROVED AND THEY ARE ENGAGED AND ACTIVE IN BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES IN YUBA COUNTY

OBJECTIVE: Expand access to health services (including mental, behavioral, physical, locational and alcohol/substance abuse)

Support agencies that provide outpatient medical and behavioral health programs for the low and moderately severe mentally ill

- March 2026, New Day Training Center officially launched its GoFundMe page! Contributions will:
 - Support and train future therapists
 - Expand access to care for underserved communities
 - Create a safe, healing space for those who need it mostDonate, or share <https://gofund.me/c80e389f1>
- March 2026, Casa de Esperanza reported they are offering a 6-week workshop, "Empowering Change", designed to help break free from fear-based belief systems and build healthier, more balanced relationships.
- \$25,000 in YCCSC 2026 Regular funding was awarded to New Day Training Center to provide low-income couples, sexual trauma survivors and families who need mild to moderate level therapeutic care with mental and behavioral health group therapy.
- \$20,000 in YCCSC 2026 Regular funding was awarded to Casa de Esperanza to provide transportation, childcare and support services to Yuba County victims of family violence who are accessing mental and behavioral health services.

Support agencies that provide semi-permanent shelter that offer a comprehensive array of services to include mental health counseling and substance abuse programs

- The Life Building Center is a coordinated entry site for all homeless in the area and provides a 25-bed shelter. The Life Building Center offers many programs that help provide self-sufficiency, from medical services to education and casework. February 2026, classes onsite included Living in Balance, Anger Management, Achieving Healing Through Education and Determination.

OBJECTIVE: Provide opportunities that improve the quality of life of low-income residents in Yuba County

Support the creation of affordable housing, transitional housing and permanent supportive housing in the region

- February/March 2026 newsletter included an article on Regional Housing Authority's groundbreaking ceremony for Richland Village, a 133 unit of one, two and three bedroom apartment complex, located at 470 Bernard Drive, Yuba City. Construction anticipated to be completed in 2027.

Support agencies that improve the areas in which the low-income live, including but not limited to; improving safe passages; developing parks/community centers, low-cost housing rehabilitation programs, etc.

- Habitat for Humanity completed improvements on Pine Street in Marysville and the complete refurbishment of one 2-bedroom house in March. They accepted applications through March 13 from an active military member

or veteran, or someone who has maintained stable rental housing after experiencing homelessness, for home ownership.

- The City of Marysville offers a Housing Rehabilitation Program, operated by Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter, that provides loans for low-income homeowners at 0% interest with monthly payments deferred for 30 years. Grants are also available for lead-based paint remediation as well as temporary relocation expenses, if needed.
- Habitat for Humanity is accepting home repair applications within Yuba City limits, which provide a 30-year, 3% simple interest deferred loan to address health and safety repairs.

OBJECTIVE: Increase community engagement among low-income residents

Increase awareness of volunteer, board and committee opportunities available within regional service providers

- February/March 2026 newsletter had an article on Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium's new "Volunteer" link for agencies to post on and for people to find volunteer opportunities. It also had flyers for low-income sector volunteers needed for YCCSC's board and low-income, Private and Public sector volunteers for SCCAA's board.

GOAL 3: EDUCATE THE COMMUNITY OF EFFORTS AND PROGRESS TO REDUCE HOMELESSNESS AND POVERTY AND ASSIST AGENCIES THAT SERVE THE LOW-INCOME TO INCREASE THEIR CAPACITY TO ACHIEVE RESULTS

OBJECTIVE: Strengthen the efficiency, effectiveness and sustainability of YCCSC and its service providers

Encourage and educate the non-profit community of funding opportunities and capacity building measures

- February/March 2026 newsletter (attached) was distributed and included information/tips on Fiscal Sponsorships for Nonprofits, How to Write a Grant Report, three webinars/workshops that address nonprofit organization needs, seven grant opportunities, nonprofit agency events and more.

Increase community education about YCCSC and its service providers activities, achievements, needs, volunteer opportunities, etc.

- February/March 2026 posted flyers on Facebook to promote Seniors on the Go/AARP Free In-Person Tax Preparation Service, Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health Focus Group meeting, Yuba-Sutter Food Bank February food distribution schedule, Habitat for Humanity Rural Rally Pine Street Home application process, Twin Cities Rescue Mission fundraiser banquet, Yuba County First 5 car seat check-up event, Yuba County Office of Education Forklift Training and more.
- February/March 2026 newsletter had an article/flyer listing YCCSC's 2026 funded agencies and its board vacancies.
- (Ongoing) Each board meeting is printed in Appeal Democrat and Territorial Dispatch under events or business calendar and the agenda packet is posted at the Yuba County Library, Yuba County Government Center and on YCCSC website.

Maintain and refresh YCCSC website, Facebook page and bi-monthly newsletter

- Facebook page was created September 2016 and is posted on regularly. Currently it has 1,019 followers.
- Bi-monthly newsletter began distribution in December 2016. It is currently distributed to 233 contacts from local non-profits.
- (Ongoing) YCCSC and its service providers activities are posted on Facebook, www.yubacares.org and/or in the bi-monthly newsletter to increase visibility.
- (Ongoing) a services resources page by category is on YCCSC's website www.yubacares.org and is reviewed and updated continually.

Misc. activities to strengthen the efficiency and effectiveness of YCCSC and its service providers

- February/March 2026, YCCSC management listened to CSD Service Provider quarterly meeting, California ROMA Coalition meeting and CAA Board Recruiting and Retention training webinar.
- (ongoing) YCCSC's Executive Director is active with the following groups in an effort to encourage community agencies to partner with Coordinated Entry, collaborate together and find solutions for our region:
 - President-Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium (Continuum of Care)
 - Board member-Sutter Community Affordable Housing Board
 - Administrative staff to Sutter County Community Action Agency

After careful consideration, I have decided that it is time for me to step away from this role due to personal commitments. This decision was not made lightly.

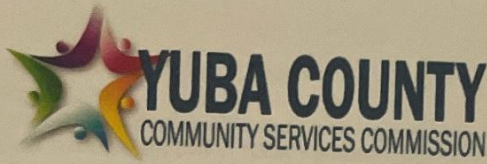


